

Keeping Medical Records

Overview

Keeping good clinical records is essential for continuity of care, especially where many clinicians are involved in delivering care. Good record keeping is an integral part of good medical practice.

If a doctor is faced with any legal problems as a result of their practice, a patient's notes will be the foundation of their defence.

The session includes case scenarios to help address the importance of good record keeping, as well as outlining the common pitfalls that can lead to complaints, claims or disciplinary action.
